

Lee Frayer is one of the oldest men n the untomobils industry. He graduated from the Ohio State University in 1896 and immediately entered the sas engine field, designing many sta-lionary engines, one of the best known of his products being the Coumbus stationary engine.

After short experiences with motorcles and air-cooled motors, a type of the latter being adopted by sevral aviators, Frayer began the propraisement and advertisement for duction of the Frayer-Stiller type of air-cooled motor and, after one year of experimenting, organized what was known as the Oscar Lear Automobile Company and placed the first machine on the market in the fall of 1964.
