SINKING OF TITANIC TAKES LIVES OF 1200

Nearly Nine Hundred Persons are Saved Mostly Women and Children

It is now given out that 1200 people had been accounted for, which means less than one-half of the world's greatest passenger ship passengers aboard. The Titanic lies burned two miles beneath the ocean surface, midway between Sandy Island and Cape Race. Her position when she struck the iceberg was given as 41°46' N., 50°14' W.

According to the Carpathia's advice, the liner sank at 2:30 o'clock Monday morning, nearly four hours after striking an iceberg.

It is now established that there were about 2100 persons on the liner. This was the estimate of the liner in New York, who gave the number of passengers as 1200, the remainder of 800 making up the crew.
