

## HOME IN RUINS FROM CYCLONE

Ben W. Robinson Got Bad News  
Sunday and Left for  
Missouri

HAPPILY NONE OF HIS  
FAMILY WERE INJURED  
BY THE WIND STORM

Ben W. Robinson received a telegram Sunday noon from his wife saying their home was in ruins from a cyclone but conveying at the same time the happy news that the family were all safe. Mr. Robinson made every effort to get in touch with his home town at Knob Lick, Mo., to learn details of the affair and the extent of his loss. The telephone lines seemed to be down and he could not get connection nearer than several miles from Knob Lick. Mr. Robinson left for Missouri Sunday midnight without having any further news and would arrive yesterday afternoon at his home. Just when the storm occurred was not learned and Mr. Robinson wondered how his brick residence could be badly damaged without injury to his family. Sunday morning papers told of wind storms in Northern Missouri but none in the southeastern portion in which his home is located. Mr. Robinson has been here some time erecting one of his new Coal Washers for the St. Bernard Mining Co.

A dispatch to the St. Louis Globe Democrat reports that Mrs. Robinson suffered a broken arm in the wreckage of her home.

## STEAMSHIP TITANIC GOES TO BOTTOM

Off Newfoundland Banks with  
1200 Souls Aboard

### COLLIDED WITH LARGE ICEBURG

The White Star Line Steamer "Titanic" collided with an iceberg Sunday night off the Newfoundland banks and sank at 2:20 Monday morning. There were 2,100 souls aboard and only 808 were saved. This is the greatest disaster of its kind in history. Among those on board and thought to be lost are Col. John Jacob Astor, Benjamin Guggenheim, Geo. D. Widener, Isadore Strauss, J. Bruce Isam, Col. Washington Reebing, builder of the Brooklyn bridge, Chas. M. Hayes Pres. of the Grand Trunk Railway, and a number of other notable people. The "Titanic" was the largest steamer afloat and was making her maiden trip from Liverpool to New York. She was built at the cost of ten million dollars.
