TITANIC SINKS INTO ATLANTIC WITH THIRTEEN HUNDRED FIFTY VICTIMS

ONLY EIGHT HUNDRED AND SIXTY-EIGHT SURVIVORS FROM ABOARD THE CARPATHIA NOW EN ROUTE TO NEW YORK—OTHER SHIPS GIVE UP SEARCH FOR SURVIVORS—JOHN JACOB ASTOR AMONG THE MISSING—CAPTAIN SMITH GOES DOWN WITH HIS SHIP, AFTER THIRTY YEARS IN SERVICE OF COMPANY—NO BLAME ATTACHED TO HIM.

The appalling magnitude of the wreck of the Titanic has been little mitigated by the fragmentary information which filtered in today.

The rescuing steamer Carpathia now en route to New York with eight hundred and sixty-eight survivors, believed to be all that were saved. The Titanic is at the bottom of the Atlantic with thirteen hundred and fifty victims.

Hope that the Parisian and Virginian had picked up other survivors was dashed to the ground by word to the Allen line offices today.

The crash with the iceberg came when most of the passengers on board the ill-fated steamship had retired. Many rushed on deck in scant clothing and there was no time for them to return before entering the boats, which foundered in the darkness and chill wind off the ice mountains. The passengers huddled together praying for dawn. At 2 a. m. the Titanic dove to the bottom. About dawn the Carpathia arrived.

The traditions of the sea were apparently honored as most of the passengers rescued were women and children.

Captain Smith, thirty years in the service of the company, went down with his ship. He was the ill-fated commander of the Olympic, when that ship collided with the British cruiser Hawke. No blame is attached to him for the accident in which he lost his life.

The Carpathia will probably be in wireless communication with Sable Island tonight. So far her messages are transferred by the Olympic, which is now out of reach.

Men prominent on two continents are among the missing. Among them:

COLONEL JOHN JACOB ASTOR, ISADOR STRAUSS, New York Millionaire Merchant.

BENJAMIN GUGGENHEIM, one of the most wealthy men in the world.

President has sought in vain for tidings of his aide, Archibald Butt.

President Charles M. Hays of the Grand Trunk Railway, his wife and daughter are among the saved. Alfred G. Vanderbilt, at the last moment, changed his mind and did not sail on the Titanic.

Henry B. Harris, the theatrical manager, is not reported saved.

Sir Como and Lady Duff-Gordon were rescued.

All Hope Abandoned

St. Johns, April 16.—All hope that any of the passengers or crew, other than those aboard the Carpathia, are alive was abandoned this afternoon. All the steamers in the vicinity of the disaster have continued on their voyage.

Resolution of Sympathy.

Washington, D. C., April 16.—The house today unanimously adopted a resolution of sympathy for the relatives of the Titanic victims.

New York N. Y., April 16.—The Carpathia is expected to arrive here Friday morning. She is a 13-knot ship. The list of survivors received here this morning includes Mrs. John Jacob Astor.

The Titanic is the first great liner to meet disaster on the maiden voyage. The Naronic of the same line

left here on her second voyage twenty years ago with three hundred on board and was never heard from.

A message from Captain Rostron of the Carpathia received here this morning says his ship is coming slowly through the field of ice.

Men Passengers Perished.

St. Johns, April 16.—Wireless messages received here indicate that a large majority of the men on the Titanic perished. Messages from the Carpathia picked up at Cape Race state that all boats launched by the Titanic's crew are accounted for. These were filled largely with women and children with sufficient crew to guide them. It is generally believed that all who survived are now aboard the Carpathia.

Parisian Has No Survivors.

Halifax, April 16.—The Allen liner Parisian reports by wireless, via Sable Island, that she has no Titanic passengers aboard.

Carpathia Due Thursday.

Washington, D. C., April 16.—A wireless to Collector Loeb says the Carpathia will arrive in New York Thursday afternoon. Assistant Secretary of the Treasury Curtis has directed that all customs regulations be waived to facilitate landing.

Storm Follows Disaster.

Montreal, April 16.—The weather signal station of the Gulf of St. Lawrence reported heavy fogs off Nova Scotia and that violent thunder storms broke last night traveling eastward. Such conditions left small hope for the rescue of any of the survivors, who might be still adrift on rafts or in boats.

Massive Wreckage Sighted.

Halifax, April 16.—The cable ship Mina, anchored off Cape Race when the Titanic first called for help, reported this afternoon sighting a great mass of wreckage, but no boats or rafts. This disposes of the last faint hope that the Mina might have other survivors. The Parisian is reported steaming slowly through the heavy field of ice, but sighting no boats or bodies. The water is very cold. Even had persons clung to wreckage they must soon have died of exposure.

Didn't Enough Life Boats.

London, April 16.—The apparent fact that the Titanic's life boats were not sufficient to accommodate her personnel is causing much comment here. The law doesn't provide the number to be carried by the giant liners, as it was formulated before they were designed.
