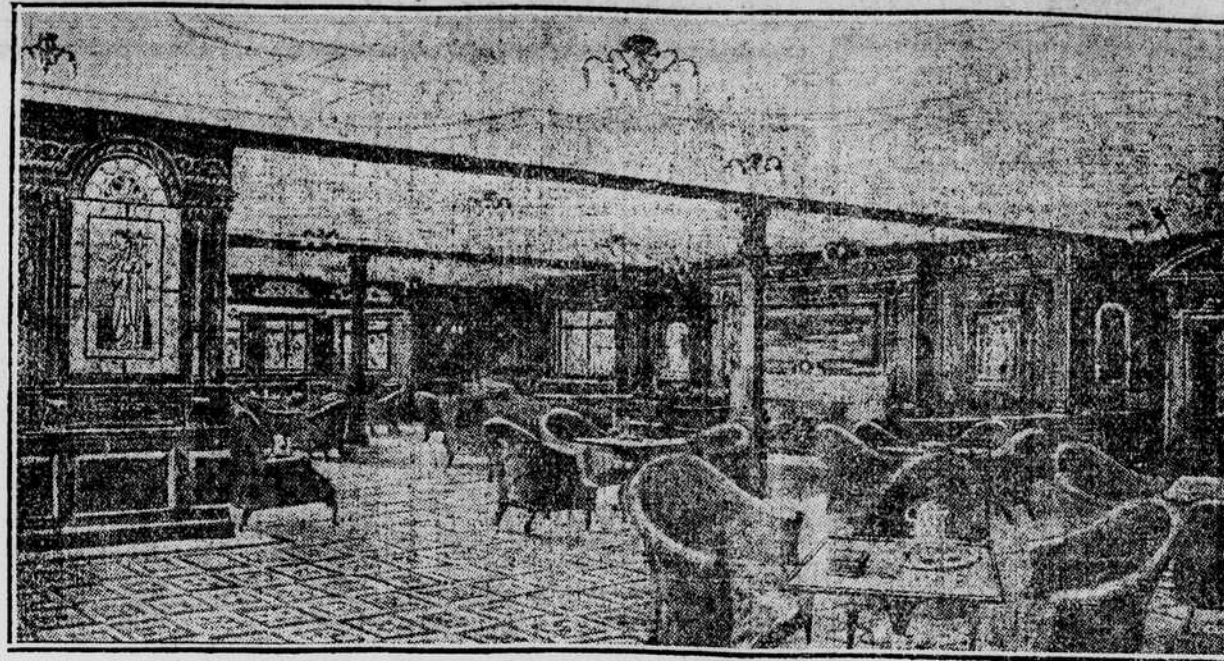

TITANIC SMOKE ROOM.

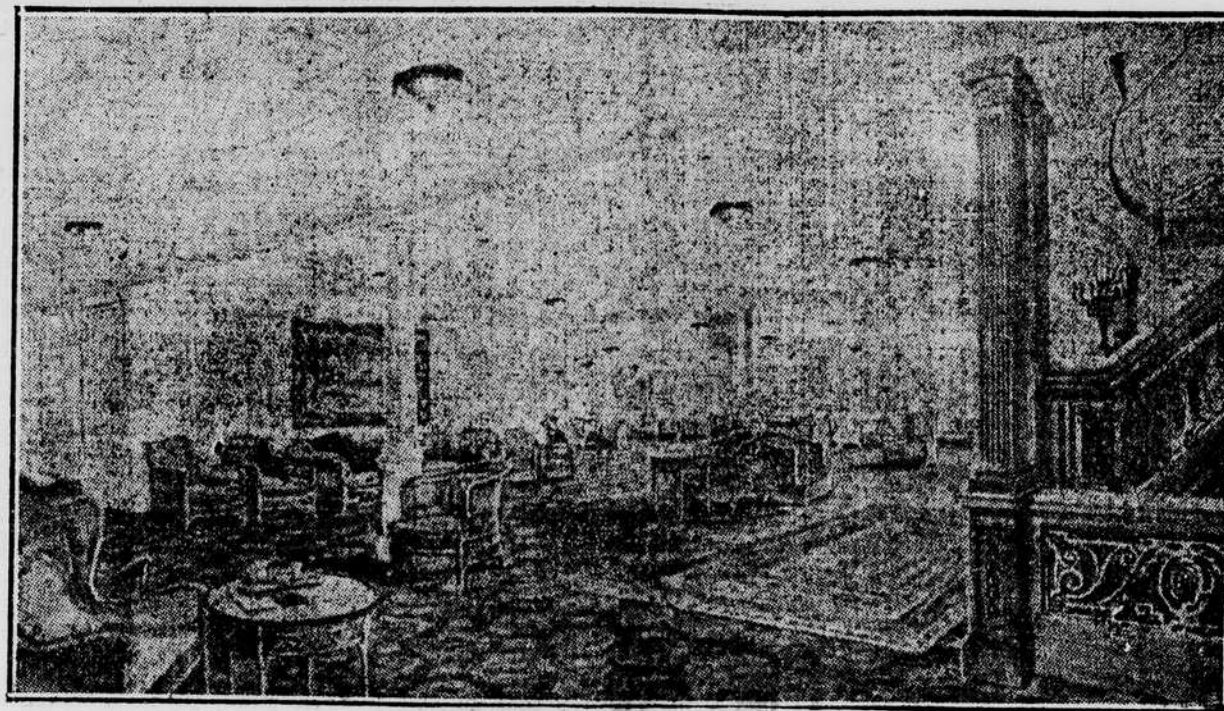
ascertain if there were any New Haven people on board. Mr. Kelsey said today that so far as could be learned there were no New Haven people on the ship.

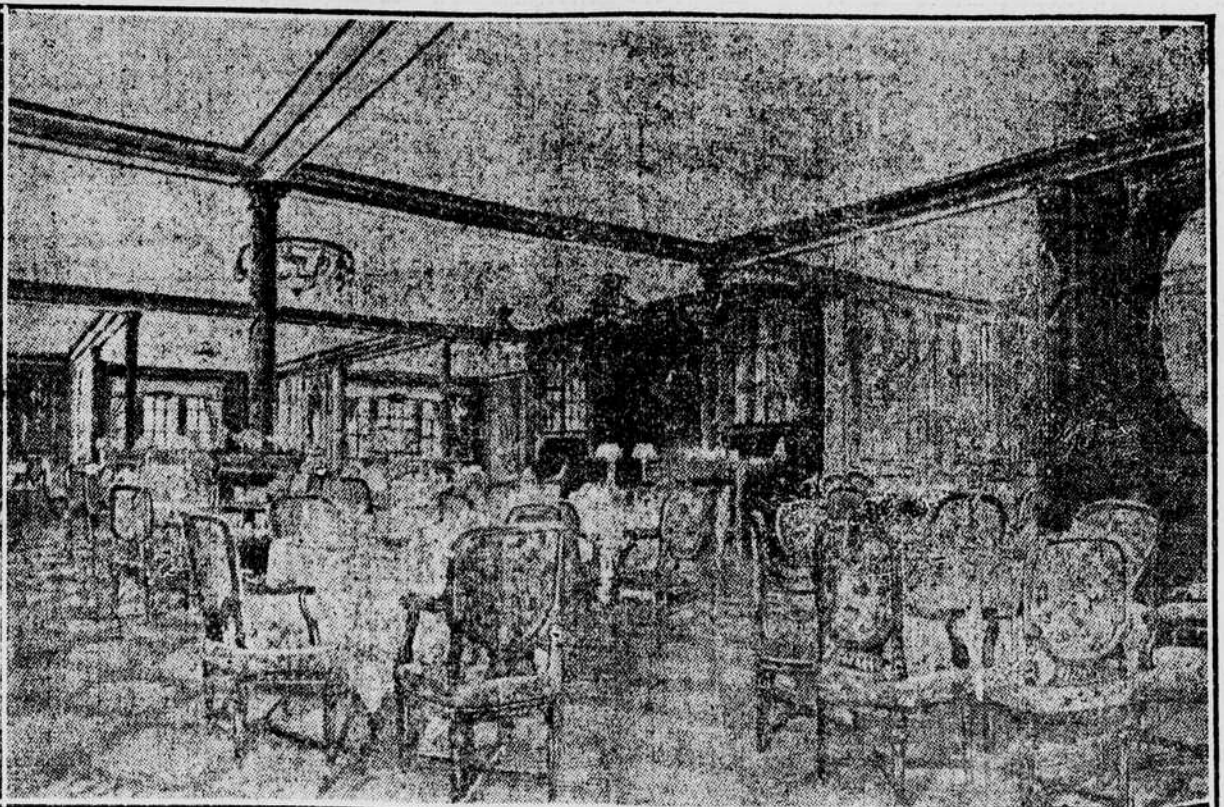
RECEPTION ROOM, TITANIC.

LIGHT SHIP SUNK

Saybrook, April 16.—An unknown bound steamer believed to be either of the New London or Fall River line struck Cornfield Point lightship in the dense fog at midnight last night, tearing a hole in the bow of the lightship. The steamer veered off before the crew of the lightship who were on duty all night, could learn her identity. Capt. John Beebe of the lightship came ashore here this morning and reported the accident to the lighthouse officials at Tompkinsville, S. I. He said that the lightship was perfectly safe as long as the sound remained calm, but should a gale come up it would be almost impossible to save her from sinking.

Capt. Beebe says there were several steamers manœuvring about the lightship at midnight endeavoring to get their bearings. He is unable to say whether the steamer was injured or not.
