ARRANGEMENTS ARE MADE FOR ARBOR DAY PLANS

Committee Puts in Busy Evening at Meeting Last Night

Last evening the arrangement committee of Arbor Day plans met at the Sagebrush Club Rooms to go into details for the program on Friday.

The appointing of sub-committees that was made at the original meeting proved to be an excellent plan, as each committee reported progress and made some interesting reports.

In the matter of planting trees about the Federal Building Postmaster Hottel, who is enthusiastic and telegraphed to Washington and permission was allowed to plant trees around the building.

The arrangements for planting on the Prison road have been completed. A number of trees will be set out along the bank early in the morning.

Many citizens when approached stated that they intended planting trees and with what can be figured several hundred shade and ornamental trees will be on foot.

An executive committee consisting of Mayor Bonjard, Dr. Cayel, Judge Norcross, Rev. Thomas and Professor Hurling was appointed. They will form some plans for a program in which the public is invited to attend. This program will be ready for publication tomorrow and will consist of an address by the Mayor, singing by the children and other literary affairs.

Arbor Day in Carson this year is not going to be a mere holiday as in the past, but a season of activity and a great deal of good will come about through the efforts of the citizens who have responded to this important call for the City Beautiful.

Arrangements have further been made for a musical program. At the meeting Mrs. Ed. Yerington was appointed chairman of this section of the day's doings and will conduct the musical program.

It is probable that the services will be held during the early afternoon in front of the Federal Building, where a ceremonial tree will be planted.

The general tree planting, both by the committee and the citizens, will take place in the morning in order to give all a chance to attend the afternoon services. The merchants will be asked to close during a portion of the day on in the afternoon and everyone will thus be given a chance to participate in these ceremonies.

NEW HANDS CONTROL THE KEANE-WONDER

Stock Advances on the Receipt of News

Keane Wonder was the sensation on the streets today owing to sudden advance in the market quotations of the stock. Last Saturday the best bids were around sixteen cents and today people are refusing to sell at 35. The advance is ascribed to the fact that wealthy Philadelphia men have acquired control of the company, having purchased the holdings of Thomas B. Riekey, former President of the State Bank & Trust Company, through the wrecking of which Goldfield people lost many thousands of dollars. Riekey is said to have kept the Keane Wonder stock for himself out of the wreck of the bank.

It is reported here upon good authority that Homer Wilson, one of the early promoters of the property and for several years its manager, was in the deal and will remain in charge of the mine. Only about 800,000 shares of the stock are on the market, according to reports. It is said that the new men in control will proceed to operate the property on a larger scale than in the past, and that the capacity of the mill will be increased shortly.—Tribune.

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The contention of the Lovelock ranchers, whose water rights date back for forty or fifty years, is that they are being deprived of water to irrigate their crops by the Pacific Reclamation Company, which has built a large reservoir at the headwaters of the Humboldt River and is storing therein the entire flow of Bishop, Burnt and Trout Creeks, three important tributaries of the main stream—Humboldt Star.

SINKING OF THE TITANIC MAKES BIG DEATH LIST

Little Additional Details of the Greatest Marine Accident

Little authentic news of the sinking of the great ship Titanic has been received on account of bad weather off the Atlantic Coast. The latest reports show that of the entire passenger list but 808 were saved from the list of 2180 on board the ship, which leaves 1372 who have lost their lives in the accident.

From the meagre descriptions so far furnished it appears that not only the ship went down together with the life boats, but that the ship sank in a very short time, and that the rescue steamer Carpathia is slowly making her way to New York where she should be sighted during the day, when a definite list of the survivors will be made known. No further life boats or rafts or floating survivors have been picked up.

The fact that the field where the ship sank is covered with ice is believed to have caused additional deaths to those who did leave the ship at the last moment when it was found that all hope was abandoned.

Only such members of the crew as were necessary to man the life boats were taken off, while the Captain and practically all the officers went down with the ship.

U. S. GRAND JURY FINISHES IT'S WORK

The Federal Grand Jury, which has been in session for several days, concluded its labors last evening. The final report shows that twenty-two indictments were returned, with three were ignored. It is expected that a number of prisoners will enter their pleas at once. Most of the cases were for selling whiskey to Indians, which offense against Uncle Sam seems to be the popular crime among a certain class of Nevada wells.
