Two Thousand Lives Reported Lost. New York, April 17.-The Camper-down wireless station at Halifax tolay sent the Associated Press the follewing dispatch:

We are now in communication with Carpathia and in position to announce unofficially that the Titanic struck an enormous berg and sunk; over men, on Carpathia."

Attention Galled to Obvious Error. The attention of the Camperdown station was at once called to the obvious error in figures which would give the total of lost and survived at 2.700, whereas the total number of assengers and crew is about 2,200. n reply to this inquiry the following ther explanation was received from Haltfax

The Marconl station reports that nothing authentic regarding the lost known on board the Carpathia, but the steamer Franconia in relaying the essages from the Carpathia says that the total number of saved is only 710. There is no list of missing on the Cunarder and only a rough estimate of her total passenger list. There probably will be more than 2,200 on the ship, as quite a number boarded her at Cherbourg."


