

MIND GIVES WAY AFTER 36 HOURS' WAIT FOR NEWS

Aged Man's Ninety-Year-Old
Mother Was in 'Steerage'
of the Titanic.

Watchers maintaining a vigil for news of their friends at the White Star offices were distressed by a pathetic incident about 4.30 this morning. A man about sixty years of age and bearing every sign of the keenest distress was found crawling about the floor and in other ways acting strangely. For thirty-six hours he had been waiting for news of his mother, who was in the steerage on the Titanic, and it was feared that during the night his reason had become affected.

When questions were put to him it was found that he could not answer them. He was then recognized as one of the inquirers who waited all day yesterday in the steerage department in the basement. He had then said that he was Gossia Kugler of No. 4, Rutgers place, and that his mother, who was ninety years of age, was coming over in charge of his nephew, to him before she died.

He came to this country, he said, sixty-six years ago and never until then had been able to send for his aged mother to join him.

After he was questioned this morning he wandered across Broadway and disappeared. No attempt was made to stop him. It was felt certain that he would soon return to the offices.

OFFER PRAYERS IN SENATE AND HOUSE.

WASHINGTON, April 17.—Direct reference to the Titanic disaster was made in the Rev. Henry N. Coudon, blind chaplain of the House, when that body convened yesterday. He said:

"Our Father, appalled by the shocking disaster which has followed one another in the last few months, we most fervently pray that more stringent laws may be enacted and enforced, that those who are exposed to the dangers of fire and flood, the workers in mines and factories and those who travel by land or sea may be safeguarded against the selfish and grasping thoughtlessness of men."

"This we ask in the name of right and justice, in the name of truth and mercy, O God, our Father. Amen."

In asking comfort for the bereaved, Captain Pierce of the Senate said:

"Almighty God, our Heavenly Father, who art the confidence of all the ends of the earth and of them that are far off on the sea, our hearts are overwhelmed within us because of the sore distress of our people, and the sad fate that has overtaken our brethren in the great deep. In all their afflictions we are afflicted, and to whom may we turn, O Lord, but to Thee, who are our refuge and our strength and a very present help in trouble."

"Thou art the Eternal God and Thou art our refuge. Thou hast been our dwelling place in all generations. The sea is Thine and Thou hast made it. Though Thou slay us, yet will we trust in Thee. Comfort our hearts, O God, and graciously grant that neither height nor depth may separate us from the love of God, which is in Christ Jesus, our Lord. For Thy name's sake, hear our cry and answer our prayer."

GREATEST MARINE LOSS; MAY TOTAL UP \$35,000,000

Many Insurance Companies
Hard Hit and Rates Will Be
Materially Advanced.

Marine underwriters say the loss of the Titanic is the greatest of marine disasters. The estimated insurance loss for hull, cargo, baggage and life insurance is placed all the way from \$30,000,000 to \$35,000,000.

British underwriters will have to bear the greatest part of the loss, though much reinsurance was placed in Germany, and American underwriters probably will have to pay most of the loss on cargo. One Wall Street authority says the Titanic carried \$3,000,000 in diamonds and \$250,000 in rubies, besides securities and specie.

The vessel herself was insured for \$5,000,000, divided among the large marine insurance companies of the world. She was valued at \$10,000,000. William A. Prime, Vice-President of White, Peck & Hughes, said today: "This loss coming so close on the recent loss of \$5,000,000 in bullion which went down on the Oceanic, means a serious matter for many of the insurance companies and is likely to affect the prosperity of most of them."

SMITH WANTED MORE LIFEBOATS, FRIEND DECLARES

Titanic's Captain Pointed Out
Need in Case of Collision
With Iceberg or Derelict.

CHICAGO, April 17.—That Capt. Edward J. Smith of the Titanic believed the steamer was not properly equipped with lifeboats and other life-saving apparatus, was the statement made by Glenn Marston, a friend, here today.

Mr. Marston said that while returning from Europe on the Olympic in company with Capt. Smith, he remarked on the small number of lifeboats. The Titanic was then under construction.

"I noticed the small number of boats and rafts aboard the heavy passenger-carrying capacity of the ship and remarked on it to Capt. Smith," said Mr. Marston.

"Yes," he replied, "if the ship should strike a submerged derelict or iceberg that would cut through into several of

on the Titanic.

By the terms of the will of the late Rev. Isaac K. Funk of Montclair, which was probated yesterday, \$10,000 is bequeathed to his alma mater, Wittenburg College, Springfield, O. To a brother, Benjamin F. Funk, Dr. Funk left \$10,000 and the returns from \$10,000 worth of stock of the Funk & Wagnall Company, of which the testator was President at the time of his death on April 4. This stock will revert to the holders of the residue of the estate on the testator's death.

The remainder of the estate is divided between his son, Wilfred J. Funk, and daughter, Mrs. Lida M. Scott, both of Montclair, who are also appointed executors.
