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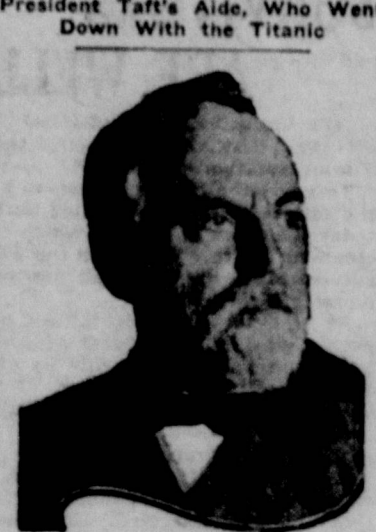

make good bread. Soak one cake  
Maggi yeast in a little warm water  
for two hours. Boil two or three  
medium sized potatoes, mash well  
and add 2 quarts of water, 2 table-  
spoons of sugar, one of salt, then  
add yeast and let stand over night.  
Next morning put your flour in pan  
and set on stove to warm. Stir con-  
stantly and when warm it is ready  
to mix. When mixed set into pan  
to rise. Then make into loaves, let  
rise and bake. Everyone says my  
bread is delicious. MRS. R.Here is a good sugar cookie  
recipe an "Old Timer" sent. Rub  
2 cups sugar and one cup butter to  
a cream. Add 4 eggs, 1 gill milk,  
an even teaspoon soda, flavoring to

COTTERILL  
CLOSES 2  
SALOONS

"Closed by Mayor Cotterill."

This sign greets the thirsty ones  
today who wend their way to the  
Alaska saloon, Third av. and Jeffer-  
son st. On the same block, too,  
the Seward hotel bar is closed.The places were closed by Chief  
Bannick yesterday afternoon, upon  
orders from the mayor, who had ve-  
tised the license for the Alaska saloon  
and the Seward hotel bar on the ground  
that, if both were granted, there  
would be three saloons on the block,  
contrary to the charter. The  
mayor thus left it to the council to  
choose which is to remain. Monday  
afternoon the council ruled over the  
votes and granted licenses to both.  
Those, however, do not be-  
come operative for a month. As  
the old licenses expired April 7, the  
mayor decided to close them both  
up in the meantime. Comptroller  
Carroll was also notified by the  
mayor to direct the license in-  
spectors to give notice to the own-  
ers of the places that no sale of  
liquor would be permitted. Car-  
roll, however, refused to take ac-  
tion thus far.Mayor Cotterill is determined to  
fight the council's violation of the  
charter in the courts.SAN FRANCISCO, April 17.—Ed-

a bullet in his brain, fired by him-
