### FIRST AUTHENTIC REPORT ADDS TO HORROR OF THE DISASTER

All Hope Has Now Been Abandoned that There Are Any Survivors from the Titanic Other Than Those Rescued by the Carpathia.

### THE CABLE SHIP BENNETT DEPARTS FOR SCENE OF THE LOST STEAMER

Coffins and Embalming Fluids Were Carried by the Vessel with the Hopes of Picking Up Bodies of the Dead That Might Be Floating on the Surface—A Wireless Report from Camperdown Says Dead May Number More Than Two Thousand.

New York, April 17.—Mrs. Caroline Bonnell, one of the survivors, wired from the Carpathia this afternoon that all women who were aboard the Titanic were saved.

New York, April 17.—Hope that there might be other survivors of the Titanic than those on the Carpathia was officially abandoned this afternoon.

Notwithstanding the startling message received this afternoon from the Camperdown wireless station, estimates given out here still place the number of dead at 1312. The cable ship, Mackay Bennett, left Halifax today carrying coffins and embalming materials, hoping to pick up the bodies of the dead who may be floating on the waves.

THE CRUISER CHESTER REPORTS TO WASHINGTON.

Says Partial List of Names of Rescued Have Been Wired to Shore.

Washington, April 17.—The Washington navy department has received a wireless message from the United States cruiser, Chester, declaring that the names of all of the first and second class passengers off the liner Titanic, and rescued by the Carpathia, have already been wired to shore. This seems to leave scant hope that men like Astor, Stead and Butt were saved, as their names have not been mentioned in any of the lists given out. The Chester says that only the names of the third class passengers who were saved from the wrecked Titanic remain to be reported.

STARTLING REPORT FROM CAMPERDOWN STATION.

Wireless to Associated Press Says More Than Two Thousand Drowned.

New York, April 17.—Associated Press received the following from the Camperdown wireless station this afternoon:

"We are in communication with the steamship Carpathia and in position to officially announce that the White Star liner, Titanic, struck an enormous iceberg and sank, over two thousand people being lost. Seven hundred survivors, mostly women, are on the Carpathia."

When questioned as to the accuracy of these figures the Camperdown station replied that the Carpathia knows nothing authentic about the number of lives lost when the Titanic sank, but said that taking into account the passengers that boarded the liner at Cherbourg will probably bring the death list up considerably higher than heretofore estimated.

The Camperdown wireless station also said that there are seven hundred and ten survivors of the Titanic aboard the Carpathia evidently meaning passengers, other survivors on that vessel being members of the Titanic's crew who were required to man the life boats.

FEELING IS INTENSE THROUGHOUT ENGLAND.

### THE WALKOUT COMPLETE ON MEXICAN RAILWAYS

No American Engineers or Conductors Are at Work on the Northern and Gulf Divisions.

Laredo, Texas, April 17.—Not an American engineer or conductor is working today on the entire northern and gulf divisions of the Mexican National railway lines. The walkout seems complete.

### COTTON FUTURES BILL FAVORABLY REPORTED

MEASURE PREPARED BY CONGRESSMAN BEALL REPORTED TO THE HOUSE.

Passage of the Bill Would Put an End to Gambling in Cotton and Grain in This Country.

Washington, April 17.—If a bill which was prepared by congressman Jack Beall of the fifth district of Texas becomes a law it will put an end to the cotton and grain exchanges in this country. The bill as fathered by Mr. Beall, and which has been before the house committee for many months, was today ordered favorably reported to the house. The object of the bill is to prohibit the gambling in cotton and grain. Mr. Beall has been making a fight for the passage of this bill almost ever since he has been in congress.

SAFETY COMMITTEE ON TOUR OF INSPECTION.

Officers and Employees of the Katy Make Trip Over the Road.

Attached to the southbound local on the Katy Wednesday was a special car carrying minor officials and employees of the road, who are known as the public safety committee. This committee was composed of the following gentlemen:

A. A. Krouse of St. Louis, general claim agent; F. S. James of Hillsboro, division superintendent; T. T. Cronin of Hillsboro, chief dispatcher; Conductor Scott; J. Alaup, bridge superintendent; Engineer Nail; Switchman Collins; John Ennis, fireman; John Flynn of Hillsboro, road master; Agent Davis of Hillsboro, and one fireman and one machinist whose names were not learned.

The purpose of this committee is to make an occasional trip over the road to inspect the road bed, bridges and other property and to report on their condition to the division superintendents, who in turn send written reports to the management. Attention is called to all weak places in the tracks and deflections in bridges, and in this way the general management is kept informed as to the physical condition of the entire line. There is a committee for every division between Galveston and St. Louis. The committee visiting Waxahachie has jurisdiction over the divisions between Hillsboro and Fort Worth and Hillsboro and Dallas. The Fort Worth division was inspected Tuesday and the committee was going south from Dallas.

Meeting of Committee.
