CARPATHIA RETICENT ON TITANIC DISASTER

Let It Be Known Today That Col. John Jacob Astor and Many Other Notables Not on Board.

[By Associated Press.]
New York, April 18.—A wireless message from the Carpathia says Col. John Jacob Astor is not among the Titanic survivors aboard her. All hope has also been abandoned for Isidore Strauss, Benjamin Guggenheim, Maj. Archie Butt, Henry B. Harris, Charles M. Hays, George D. Widener, the Philadelphia capitalist, and many other notable persons who were passengers on the ill-fated Titanic.

A censorship appears to exist on the Carpathia. Up to this forenoon not one inkling of what transpired in connection with the Titanic's sinking had been sent by the Carpathia, although for hours she had been importuned by wireless for such information.

The Carpathia carries thirteen life boats of the Titanic. It had heretofore been supposed the Titanic had twenty of these boats.

The Carpathia studiously avoids answering all questions, even President Taft's requests for information have been ignored.

Congress to Investigate.

Washington, April 18.—J. L. Bruce Ismay, president of the International Mercantile Marine Company, which controlled the steamer Titanic, and who is among the rescued on board the Carpathia, will be among the first witnesses summoned in the senate investigation of the disaster. Senator Smith of Michigan was today appointed to take six senators to New York to procure witnesses for the investigation.

Rescued Not Told of Titanic's Fate.
New York, April 18.—The Titanic story is expected to remain unknown until the Carpathia docks about 1 o'clock tomorrow morning. Private messages suggest the Carpathia survivors are ignorant of the fate of the Titanic, many wives believing their husbands were picked up by other vessels.

Defense Introduces Testimony to Defeat Tarn Letter Theory of the State.

Fort Worth, Texas, April 18.—The Norris defense today introduced several witnesses who declared separate sheets of paper could be torn so the torn edges fitted exactly, the intent being to attack the state's evidence that the other half of the Norris anonymous letter was the paper found in his pocket.

George Rosselle, a member of Rev. Norris' church, told of seeing suspicious persons near the Norris home. He was not allowed to testify whether Rev. Norris asked him to secure bloodhounds to track the persons believed to be the incendiaries.

The Mexican reply is not considered necessarily as a further incentive to intervention.

FLOOD CONDITIONS GROW WORSE DAILY

Territory Covered in Arkansas, Mississippi and Louisiana as Large as New England States.

New Orleans, La., April 18.—The Mississippi river levee at Angola, La., on the east bank, broke this morning. This break, together with the main line levee break yesterday near Beulah, Miss., and one on the Arkansas river, added more than twenty-five thousand persons to the flood sufferers in southern Arkansas, north-east Louisiana and northwestern Mississippi. The territory inundated is almost as large as the New England states.
