## CARPATHIA BEARING SURVIVORS WILL ARRIVE TOMORROW MORNING

### ISMAY ONE OF SHIP'S OWNERS THE ONLY MILLIONAIRE SAVED NO DOUBT OF ASTOR'S DEATH

Actual Number of Victims Will Not Be Known for Some Time, and Probably Never, But It Will Be Above 1500--Now Known Only 705 Were Saved--Why None of the Big Financial Men Were Saved Is Still a Mystery--Only Solution is That They Proved Their Manhood by Deliberately Sacrificing Their Lives to Save Others.

**The Story in Brief.**  
Revised figures of those saved from Titanic wreck.  
New York, April 18.—The following was given out here today by the White Star line as the final revised figures of those saved from the Titanic, and from them was deducted the numbers of the probably dead.  
The saved:  
Cabin passengers, names known—381.  
Steerage, names known—135.  
Steerage, names unknown—33.  
Crew who manned boats—165.  
Total 705.  
Missing, Probably Dead:  
First cabin passengers—172.  
Second cabin passengers—189.  
Steerage passengers—453.  
Crew, including all but four officers—700.  
Total 1,514.

New York, April 18.—It is evident that the Carpathia's story of the horror will eclipse anything in history. Arrangements were completed today to expedite the landing of the survivors when the Carpathia docks here at 9 o'clock tonight. Surveyor of the Port Henry and Immigration Commissioner Williams will personally supervise their arrival. The survivors will be grouped alphabetically on the dock and this will make the work of reuniting the survivors with relatives easy.  
Mayor Gaynor today ordered that all photographers be excluded from the dock and the streets in the vicinity roped off to keep back curious crowds. Mayor Gaynor already has started a relief fund for the widows and orphans of victims.

**Story of the Astors.**  
As the day advanced the apprehension here increased because of reports that many of the survivors are in a critical condition. It is known that Colonel John Jacob Astor, who is believed to have perished in the wreck and his bride, who was Miss Madeline Force of Philadelphia were returning so that an expected heir could be born in America. The Astor mansion had been put in readiness for their arrival. It is rumored that Astor's widow is among the survivors reported seriously ill.  
Among the victims of the disaster is "Doc" Owens, the most noted ocean gambler in the world. He and five companions had booked passage on the Titanic.

**Says News Withheld.**  
Halifax, April 18.—It is believed here that the impact with the iceberg loosened the Titanic's machinery. It is feared that many of the reserve sailors who were sleeping forward as well as many steerage passengers in the bow were crushed to death.  
Halifax newspapers openly charge that details of the disaster are being deliberately withheld and are bitter in their denunciation of the secretive tactics of steamship officials.

**Carpathia Has All Saved.**  
New York, April 18.—The Wall Street News bureau today posted a copy of a message purporting to have been received from Captain Rostron of the Carpathia by wireless to Highland Point, declaring that no one was saved from the Titanic except those on board the Carpathia, and that of these survivors 100 are in the ships hospital.

**Some Pitiful Scenes.**  
Southampton, England, April 18.—Terrible scenes prevailed here today at the offices of the White Star line, which are being stormed by the wives, children and sweethearts of the crew of the Titanic, who were all specially picked seamen representing Southampton's sea going aristocracy.  
Women and children pleaded piteously for a list of the survivors of the crew. Many of the women are broken in mind and body as a result of the long suspense.

## WILL PUT ISMAY ON THE STAND

SENATE COMMITTEE TAKES TO HOLD ISMAY AND COMPEL HIM TO MAKE STATEMENT--HE HAS ARRANGED TO LEAVE AS SOON AS HE LANDS.

Washington, April 18.—J. Bruce Ismay, managing director of the White Star line, will tell the story of the Titanic disaster, if the United States government can make him do it.  
This much was made certain today, following a lengthy conference between President Taft and Senator Smith, of Michigan, chairman of the senate sub-committee on commerce, appointed to probe the disaster. Accompanied by Sergeant at Arms Ramsdell, of the senate, and Supervising Inspector Uhler, of the steamboat inspection service, the sub-committee left for New York this afternoon, with orders to start the Titanic inquiry immediately.  
Chairman Smith desires to examine Ismay and the officers of the Titanic upon their arrival, as it is feared these officers and Ismay plan to take the first ship back to England, which would place them beyond the jurisdiction of the committee.

"To my poor fellow sufferers: My heart overflows with grief for you. I am laden with sorrow for you and weighed down by this terrible burden which has been thrust upon us. Pray God be with us, and comfort us all."

## THE LAST WORD FROM ROOSEVELT

In His Columbus Speech He Enunciated the Progressive Principles of the Thoughtful and Sincere of His Party.

### A DECLARATION OF FAITH

He Advocates as Weapons of Defense in the Hands of the People Short Ballot, Direct Nominations, Direct Election of Senators, the Initiative and Referendum, and the Recall of Judges as a Last Resort to Get Rid of Bad Judges.

Portland, Or., April 17, 1912.  
Col. E. Hofer, Salem, Ore.:  
Dear Sir: Herewith please find copy of message received from Theodore Roosevelt as a greeting to Oregon progressives. We are glad to get this at this time, regretting, of course, our inability to have him with us in the fight. Splendid reports are coming to us from all over the state today.

Theodore Roosevelt, in his Columbus speech, enunciated the progressive principles of the thoughtful and sincere element of his party and the people. He has planted his standard at the head of the great progressive movement and offered himself as the leader of the progressives, not on his principles, but on their principles. We all recognize him as the leader of the Republican progressives, and he, by the splendid results in Illinois, Pennsylvania and Maine has become a formidable figure, leading within the Republican party, at least, the truest American spirit of the day.

Col. Roosevelt's Columbus speech is a remarkable declaration of faith in the American people, in which he states that "we progressives believe that the people have the right, the power and the duty to protect themselves and their own welfare; that human rights are supreme over all other rights; that wealth should be the servant, not the master, of the people; that "we hold it a prime duty of the people to free our government from the control of money in politics;" and that "for this purpose we advocate, not as ends in themselves, but as weapons in the hands of the people, all governmental devices which will make the representatives of the people more easily and certainly responsible to the people's will."

Among these weapons he commends the short ballot, direct nomination, the direct election of senators, the initiative and referendum, and the recall of judges "as a last resort," to get rid of the bad judges. This will not hurt the honest judges, but will get rid of crooked and corporations biased and corrupted judges, if need be.

Upon this platform we can all stand and "with malice toward none and charity for all move forward and do the right as we see it, and makes our truly a government of the people, by the people and for the people."

Wishing you all and our cause the highest success and cordially thanking you for the splendid help you have given the progressive movement in this campaign, I am,

**Johnson to Fight.**

## SPLENDID TRIBUTE TO BOURNE

SENATOR LAFOLLETTE PAYS MAGNIFICENT TRIBUTE TO OREGON SENATOR AND TO HIS GREAT WORK FOR THE STATE AND NATION.

Roseburg, Ore., April 18.—Refusing to pay any attention to the instruction that this was the place where all of the Oregon land fraud cases were instigated, and that Senator Jonathan Bourne, Jr., was a very unpopular man, Senator Robert LaFollette opened his address to 2000 people here yesterday with a remarkable eulogy of Bourne.

"I have been told that this will cost me votes but I want you to understand that it is not votes, but it is a principle that I stand for," said LaFollette. "Jonathan Bourne has done more to bring the name of this state to favorable attention of the people of the nation than any other man or all the men together whom you have sent to Washington."

"I hear that he is blamed for not coming home. Well I have not been home for a year and a half and I have not made a speech in my state for four years. I have been too busy, so has he. While I was working on the railroad legislation he was busy with parcels post."

"I hear that there is a move on foot to defeat him at Friday's election. I want to tell you right now that if Oregon does not return Jonathan Bourne to the United States senate, this state, which boasts of its progressiveness will have struck a hard blow."

Big Manufacturers' Display to Be Made at Salem Made in Oregon Dinner at Hotel Imperial--A Great Co-operative Movement of the Thousand Oregon Industries to Keep the Home Market--Three Days' Campaign in Linn County That Will Educate Thousands of Consumers as to What Oregon Manufacturers Have to Offer Them.

**Big Campaign Opens.**  
This week Thursday, Friday and Saturday will be conducted at Albany a big Made in Oregon campaign. The Commercial club has secured the big Armory building and an exhibit has been placed there of the products of the Linn county industries which will be visited by nearly all the people of Linn county and many from Benton county across the river.

Thursday evening the business men and commercial organizations of Linn county will meet members of the Manufacturers Association at the Armory and there will be addresses about the Oregon industries and industries that they believe can be established at cities like Albany. It will be a great educational movement to interest the manufacturers and the merchants in co-operation to stimulate the home market and make a larger field for the products of the Oregon payrolls and to increase those payrolls.

**Consumers League Organized.**  
On Friday evening there will be an educational program with addresses on industrial education in the public schools and colleges. The college and public schools will be visited and addresses made Friday to the growing generations on the Oregon manufactures and cards will be sent into every home to enlist the fathers and mothers in the Oregon First Consumers League. At least two thousand signers to the Consumers League pledge at the head of this column will be secured at the Albany convention for the Made in Oregon Movement.

**Saturday Ladies Night.**  
On Saturday evening the question of how the women in the homes can help the Oregon industries will be discussed. The addresses will be along the line of showing the women of Albany that it is their duty to call for products of Oregon manufactures when buying breakfast foods, flour, paste, soap, baking powder, clothing

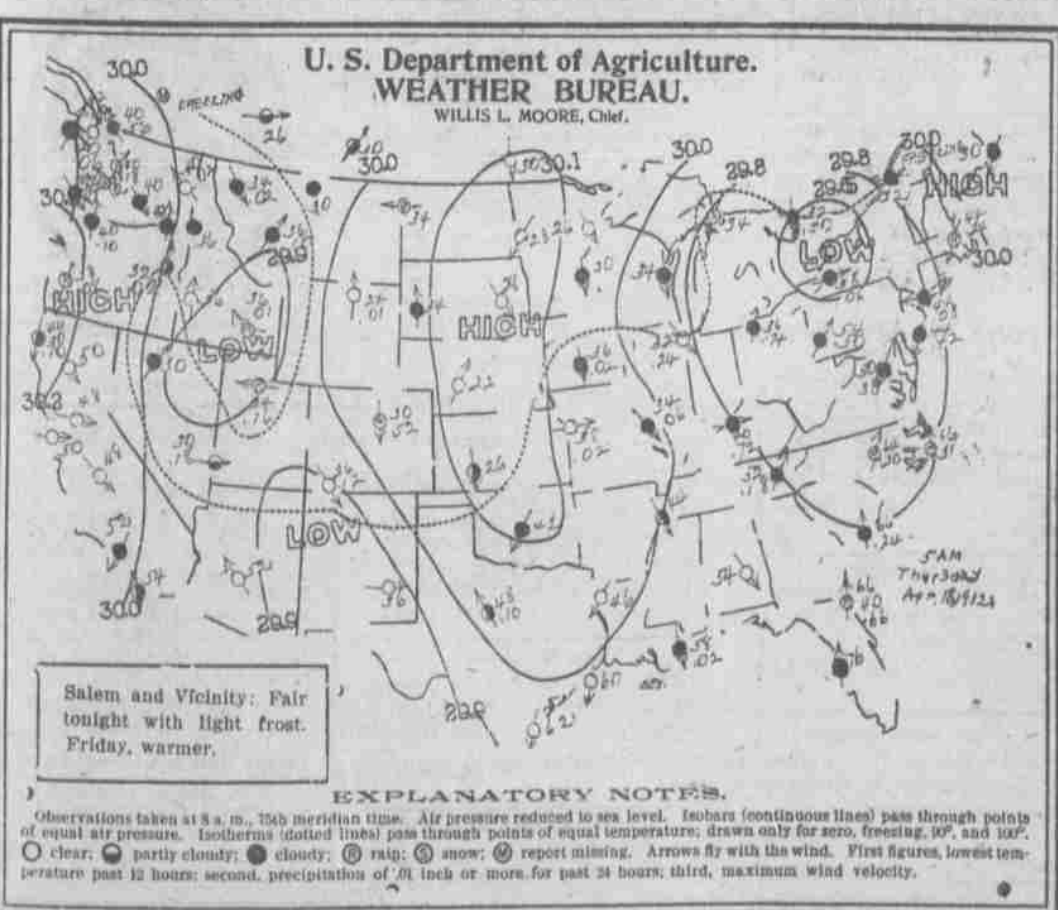
and all that is used in the home. Products of the woolen mills will be shown and the new Oregon Mohair industry will be displayed with samples of the goods.

**Oregon Made Dinners.**  
On Friday evening, April 26th, will be given the first of a series of Made in Oregon dinners at the Imperial hotel at Portland. The entire bill of fare will be produced in Oregon, and the name of the manufacturer will be given in each instance on the menu card. This dinner is in charge of a committee of which Mr. Scott of the Davis-Scott Belting company is chairman, and Mr. Sidney B. Vincent, secretary of the Manufacturers' Association, is general manager. Both the eatables and drinkables and smokeables will be Made in Oregon products.

**Salem Is Organizing.**  
The next exposition of Made in Oregon products will be held at Salem. A committee composed of C. M. Eppley, C. K. Spaulding, A. Hucklestein, S. W. Gleason, and E. Hofer has been named by the Salem Board of Trade to make all arrangements for a display of the industries of Marion county at the new armory building. The exhibits will be varied and interesting and will be seen by at least twenty thousand people. The Manufacturers Association is preparing to have some of the best speakers in the state present on that occasion and talk Made in Oregon.

**Great Co-operative Movement.**  
There are estimated to be one thousand manufacturing establishments in the state, large and small. These range from corporations with millions of capital engaged in turning out products that are shipped to the ends of the world, to small concerns with five or ten employees. But all together they represent the largest aggregation of productive interest in the state, having more capital involved, employing more labor and putting out a larger product than any department of human activity excepting agriculture. Counting lumbering, the manufactures probably surpass even the products of the soil. All these industries have common interests in the home market and without in any way antagonizing the industries of other states they are engaged in this campaign to secure a larger share of the home business of the people of Oregon as against the east.
