SHIP HITS ICEBERG: 1500 DROWN

Titanic, World's Largest Steamer. Sinks on Maiden Trip

The White Star liner Titanic, the largest and most luxurious steamship in the world, on her maiden trip, sank at 2:20 Monday morning off the banks of Neweleven o'clock was followed by a foundland four hours after striking twenty-minute prayer and praise an iceberg. She had on board service. Epworth League was led 1,320 passengers and a crew of were reported saved, having been picked up from the lifeboats by the steamship Carpathia, after suffering greatly from cold and exposure.

The Titanic was a new ship and was supposed to be unsinkable. It was recently completed at a cost of \$10,000,000. After the iceberg was struck the wireless was used to call assistance, but other ships in range did not arrive until after the Titanic had sunk, and the only survivors were rescued by the Carpathia. Where the Titanic sank the Atlantic is two miles deep.

Half a dozen of the wealthiest men in America, with many others of prominence, were passengers on the ill-fated vessel and are supposed to have perished in this, the greatest single naval catastrophe in n the history of the world. Among n them were John Jacob Astor, Benjamin Guggenheim, Isador Straus, Major Archibald Butts, Hon. W. T. Stead and many others.

So much confidence had been placed in the ability of the watertight compartments to keep the vessel affoat under any circumstances that an insufficient amount of life-saving apparatus had been provided, thereby causing the loss of more than fifteen hundred lives.
