

# OREGON AND NEBRASKA FOR ROOSEVELT BOURNE IS DEFEATED BY BEN SELLING

## RETURNS SHOW VICTORS, THO' NOT COMPLETE

With Less Than 150 Republican and 60 Democratic Votes to Hear From La Follette, Bourne and Olcott Are in the Lead.

Dunn Wins Over Merrick—Singer Defeats Beeson—Coshaw Leads in Race for Toga.

La Follette has carried Jackson county by a narrow margin of 50 votes over Roosevelt with Taft a poor third.

Bourne carries the county by approximately 750 plurality over Selling and Olcott has a similar majority over Field for secretary of state.

Mickle has carried the county for dairy and food commissioner and Hanna is nominated by a majority of 750 as district attorney. Dunn has defeated Merrick by 700 votes for county judge, Gardner is successful as county clerk, securing 300 more votes than his two opponents combined.

Covig has defeated Flory for recorder by 300 votes, and Singler is victorious over Beeson by 450 votes. Cowgill is nominated county surveyor by the narrow margin of 20 votes, Kellogg won the nomination for coroner by 200 votes.

Wilson is the choice of Jackson county democrats by 150 plurality over Clark, and Coshaw for senator by a hundred over Pierce. Tou Velle is nominated for county judge by a two to one vote over Neil. McDonough is nominee for assessor by a close vote.

With 150 republican registered votes to hear from at 2 o'clock and 54 democratic the results in Jackson county where offices were contested were:

The result in each of these offices is almost certain to remain as final as there is not a large enough vote remaining to materially effect the men now in the lead.

## GAINS AND LOSSES ON STOCK MARKET

NEW YORK, April 20.—Today's opening stock market showed a mixture of gains and losses, the latter the more prominent. Later slight strength shown by the general list was offset by weakness in the specialties. After this the leaders gave way fractionally to below yesterday's closing. International Mercantile Marine preferred stocks and bonds sold at the lowest figures of the week. Marconi old stock declined 180 points from yesterday's high figures. The market closed dull. Bonds were irregular.

## TEDDY WINS EVERY DISTRICT IN NEBRASKA

La Follette Running Ahead of Taft, But Roosevelt Polls More Than Both of the Candidates Combined—Estimated 20,000 Over Taft.

Champ Clark Carries State by 8000—Wilson Second and Harmon is Third—Length of Ballot Delays.

LINCOLN, Neb., April 20.—Sufficient votes in yesterday's presidential preference primary election had been counted at noon today to make certain that Colonel Roosevelt had carried every district in the state. Senator La Follette is running ahead of President Taft but Roosevelt polled more than both of the other candidates.

Champ Clark has carried the state by a plurality estimated at 8,000, the other aspirants for the democratic nomination—Governor Wilson of New Jersey, and Governor Harmon of Ohio—being far behind. In the second district Governor Harmon received two votes, Clark getting the rest. In the eastern counties, where William J. Bryan is not in such popular favor, Harmon polled a heavy vote.

Adherents of Colonel Roosevelt claim that their candidate polled 20,000 more votes than President Taft.

The length of the ballot makes the counting very slow and it will be hours before accurate figures can be obtained.

Before the election William J. Bryan pledged himself to accept the choice of the Nebraska voters as his own choice.

That Colonel Roosevelt polled more than twice the combined vote of La Follette and Taft is shown in returns from one-fourth of the total number of precincts in the state. The count so far tabulated gives:

Roosevelt 11,896; La Follette 3,068; Taft 2,972.

The race between Senator Brown and Congressman Norris for the senatorial nomination is close, while former Governor Shallenberger is leading in the democratic senatorial contest.

The republicans have renominated Governor Chester R. Aldrich, L. R. Metcalf probably will be the democratic gubernatorial nominee.

Champ Clark's plurality over Wilson and Harmon almost equals that of Roosevelt over La Follette and Taft.

## CHANGING THE LAWS AFTER THE DISASTER

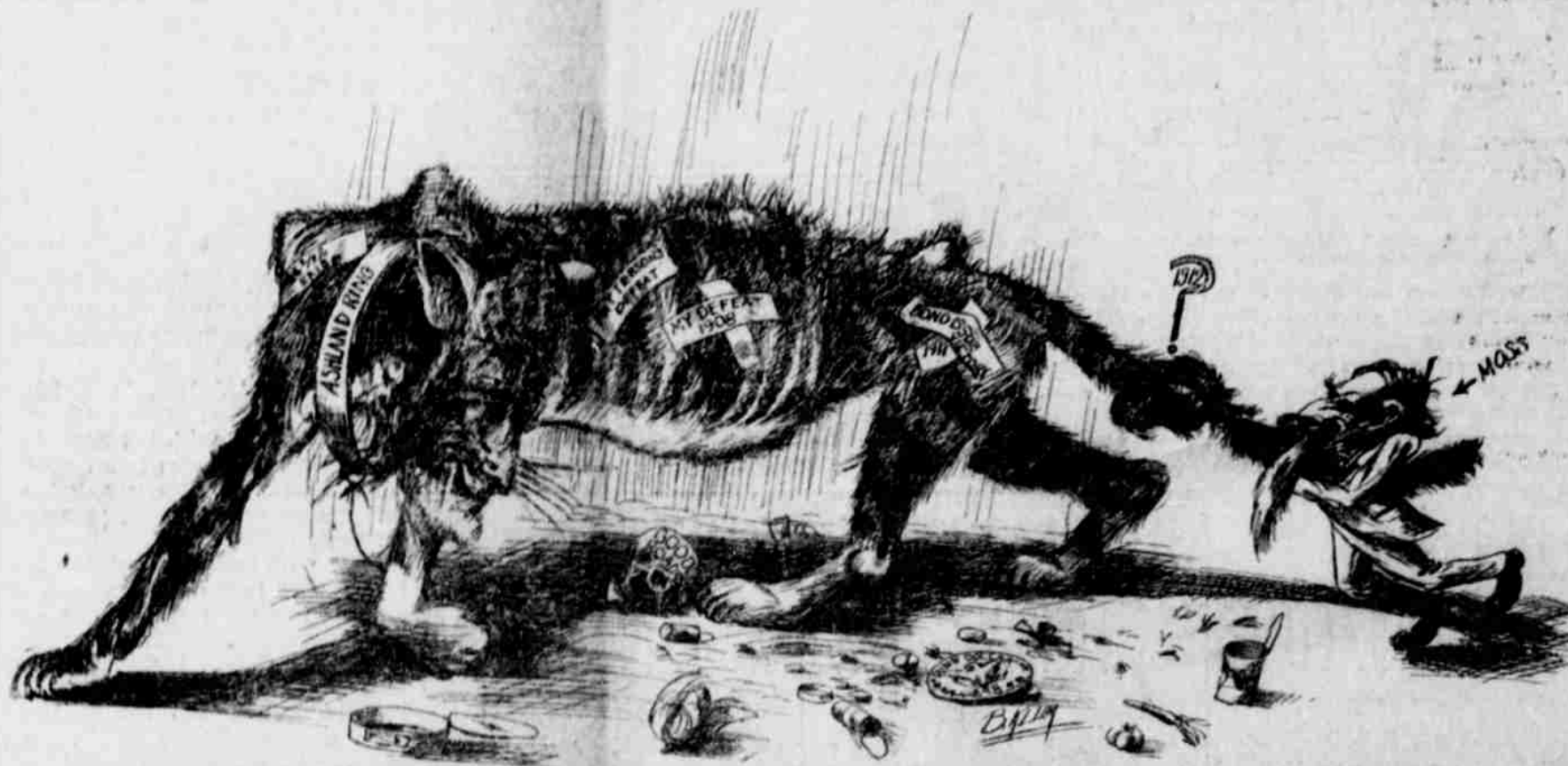
WASHINGTON, D. C., April 20.—Regulation of trans-Atlantic liners to prevent a repetition of the Titanic disaster is aimed at in a resolution introduced into the United States senate by Senator James E. Martine of New Jersey, upon which the senate foreign committee ordered a favorable report today.

The resolution provides that the president of the United States shall negotiate with other maritime powers an agreement regulating sea lanes to be used by the big liners, and for the establishment of a uniform equipment aboard the vessels, and for their systematic inspection.

## SINGLER RUNS AWAY TO GREAT SURPRISE OF ALL

Aug. D. Singler was the original jack-in-the-box in the primary election. He was nominated to the great surprise of his friends and opponents by a large majority, receiving 1475 to Beeson's 1015. Mr. Singler says he is determined to make good the confidence shown in him by his many supporters and declares that he will go onto the final lap of the race to win.

Ralph P. Cowgill is in the lead for county surveyor and will probably receive the nomination as the 150 votes yet to hear from are from districts favorable to him. Grisez, incumbent, who was supposed to be strong, did not develop the strength expected and ran third, T. W. Osgood leading in the race until a precinct in Ashland went overwhelmingly for Cowgill and placed him in the lead. The race was a five-cornered one.

G. A. Gardner of Talent won the republican nomination for county clerk over N. L. Narregan of Eagle Point and W. T. Quisenberry of this city. He received 301 more votes than his two opponents together.

## WAINWRIGHT ELECTED SUCCESSOR TO HAYS

## DUNN WINNER OVER MERRICK MAJORITY 703

George W. Dunn of Ashland, is the republican nominee for county judge. He defeated F. E. Merrick of this city by a vote of 1637 to 934, his majority being 703.

Dunn carried all of the outlying precincts with the exception of Big Butte and Willow Springs and in addition received the overwhelming support of his own precincts in Ashland which cast 660 votes for Dunn and only 38 for Merrick.

On the other hand Merrick was given only about two-thirds of the Medford vote although he carried each of the nine Medford precincts. A light vote was cast throughout the county which was a benefit to Dunn.

In Medford the vote was as follows: N. W. Medford, Dunn 10, Merrick 16; S. W. Medford, Dunn 10, Merrick 20; N. Central, Dunn 51, Merrick 31; S. Central, Dunn 26, Merrick 70; N. Main, Dunn 45, Merrick 141; S. Main, Dunn 63, Merrick 108; Oakdale, Dunn 32, Merrick 113; N. E. Medford, Dunn 24, Merrick 57; S. E. Medford, Dunn 14, Merrick 53. Total, Dunn 265, Merrick 669, majority for Merrick 404.

Jacksonville gave Dunn 105, Merrick 15.

Central Point, Dunn 80, Merrick 33. Gold Hill, Dunn 53, Merrick 7. Woodville, Dunn 28, Merrick 26.

Eagle Point, Dunn 59, Merrick 53. The I. W. W. who recently sent out a circular defaming Medford, registered as republicans to vote for Dunn.

## TOU VELLE GIVEN WARM SUPPORT; WINS OUT EASILY

Frank L. Tou Velle is the democratic nominee for county judge, being given a splendid endorsement by his party at the polls. With about 50 votes yet to hear from he has 476 votes to his opponent Judge J. R. Neil's 248. Tou Velle carried two precincts unanimously, his own and Wimer. He carried nearly every precinct.

## LA FOLLETTE NOT AT ALL DISMAYED

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., April 20.—Senator Robert M. La Follette arrived here this morning from Oregon.

Senator La Follette said: "I can not discuss the election results in Oregon and Nebraska until the full returns are in. I will say, however, that whatever the results of the election in those states, they will not in any way affect my plans for the coming campaign in California or any other state. This fight will go on to the end. Win or lose, it is the same fight—it will be in the same way and with the same confidence that the principles for which we are fighting will ultimately triumph."

## SIGNALS FROM TITANIC CALLING HELP IGNORED

NEW YORK, April 20.—J. Bruce Ismay, managing director of the White Star line must remain in the United States until the federal government has ended its investigation into the wreck of the Titanic. This much was made certain here today when Senator Alden Smith of Michigan, chairman of the sub-committee appointed by the senate commerce commission, to fix responsibility for the disaster, curtly refused a request from Ismay that he be allowed to sail this afternoon for England on the steamer Lapland.

## Probe Delay in News.

The committee investigated the delay in getting the news of the disaster ashore and the false reports alleged to have been issued by the White Star line. Thomas Cottam, the wireless operator on the Carpathia testified as follows:

"I sent several messages to the steamer Baltic, but kept no record of them. I was too busy sending. At 10:30 o'clock Monday morning I sent all the details to the Baltic. It was the whole story. The Baltic was coming toward the wreck at the time. I was not in touch with the land stations then. I told the Baltic of the Titanic's sinking, and of the rescue of those we had picked up. I told them we were going to New York."

"I did not send at any time a report that the passengers and crew had been saved, and that the Titanic was being towed into port. Nothing like that was sent, or suggested to me by any officer, passenger or anyone else aboard the Carpathia."

## Both Feet Frozen.

Bride, the assistant operator of the Titanic, a pale youth but 22 years of age, was carried into the room with his face drawn with pain and his eyes swollen. He gritted his teeth as he was placed on a couch. Bride froze both feet while awaiting rescue in the icy water.

The young man testified that his home is in London, and that he was assistant wireless operator on the Titanic, at a salary of four pounds monthly. He and Phillips alternated in six hour watches aboard the liner. He admitted that the Californian tried to report the presence of icebergs to him but said that he was too busy at the time to take the report.

## Icebergs Reported.

"M. W. L." which is the Californian, called the Titanic, saying that he had a report to make regarding the ice," said Bride, "but I was busy, and did not answer them. Half an hour later, I heard the same operator transmitting an ice report to the Baltic, and I copied it. I thought it was the same message which I had refused, but as it was not official I

## OREGON FOR ROOSEVELT BY 5000 TO 6000

Partial Returns Indicate That Selling Probably is Nominated Over Bourne, Though County Districts May Change Result.

Wilson Carries State and Harry Lane is Democratic Nominee for United States Senator.

PORTLAND, Ore., April 20.—With the count coming in slowly, returns available at noon today indicated Colonel Roosevelt had won the republican presidential nomination in the Oregon primaries by a substantial plurality. As only scattering returns from the country districts have been secured his lead has not been definitely ascertained, but is probably 5,000 or 6,000.

## La Follette Wins Portland.

Senator La Follette leads in the race in Multnomah county. Complete returns from 122 precincts out of 197 in Multnomah county give La Follette 6302; Roosevelt 5536; Taft 3888. Roosevelt is running strong in districts outside Multnomah county, and will undoubtedly prove a winner.

Governor Woodrow Wilson of New Jersey appears to have won the democratic presidential nomination, with Speaker Clark running second. Incomplete returns from Multnomah county give Wilson 510, Clark 282, Governor Harmon of Ohio a poor third with 97. Clark is running stronger in the upstate districts.

Outside the race for the republican presidential nomination the greatest interest centered in the contest between Senator Bourne and Ben Selling for the republican senatorial nomination. First reports were that Bourne was hopelessly snowed under but later it became apparent that he was making a hard fight. Selling, however, is probably nominated.

## Bourne Has a Chance.

At noon the vote in 121 out of 197 precincts in Multnomah county stood: Bourne 7319, Selling 6119. Bourne probably will carry Multnomah county by 2,000 votes. But in the districts outside Portland Selling was stronger. The vote from outside districts stood at noon: Bourne 4225, Selling 6563. Senator Bourne's supporters assert he will be nominated by the vote of the back country counties, from which no reports have come. These counties elected him in 1907.

Congressman Lafferty apparently is renominated for representative in congress from the first district. He has a lead of 636 votes over Judge Gantenbein, his nearest rival.

Olcott is nominated for secretary of state by a good majority over Field.

## ENGINEERS PRAYED AS TITANIC SANK

NEW YORK, April 20.—It was learned today that the engineers in the engine room of the Titanic, after doing all possible to save the ship, knelt down and prayed as they died. Above them on the deck men smoked and chatted as they awaited their own deaths.

The White Star line is secreting the lifeboats which the Carpathia brought here. A photographer who attempted to take pictures of them alleges that the watchman on the pier fired at him.

"At the last moment Captain Smith gave the order, 'Every man for himself now,' declared one of the surviving members of the Titanic's crew. "We jumped. Thirty of us managed to get aboard a capsized lifeboat. No passengers were sacrificed that any member of the crew might be saved."
