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### CAPT. SMITH REMAINED ON BRIDGE OF TITANIC

Died Like a Hero—Tried to Save a Little Girl After Drowning into Sea.

[By Associated Press.]

New York, April 20.—James McGann, a surviving Titanic fireman who was on the bridge with Captain Smith as the vessel went down, says two little children took refuge beside the captain, remaining with him on the bridge until the ship went down. One was a girl, the other a boy. Captain Smith jumped into the sea at the last instant with the little girl attempting to save her. McGann jumped with the boy, but was forced to let go the lad while still under water. The captain lost the girl also.

An inking developed today as to the happenings in the bowels of the Titanic after the collision. The engineers stayed by the pumps, going down with the ship.

Will Install More Life Boats.

New York, April 20.—J. Bruce Ismay, president of the International Merchant Marine Company, announces that all six steamship lines controlled by his company have been ordered to immediately install enough life boats and rafts for all passengers, regardless of regulations of any nation not so requiring.

Ismay Tried to Flee to Europe.

New York, April 20.—An explanation of the senate sub-committee's haste to get to New York to investigate the Titanic disaster came today in a statement that the government wireless operator intercepted a message from J. Bruce Ismay asking that the steamer Cedric be stopped and take him (Ismay) and the Titanic survivors back to Europe.

### ROOSEVELT WINS TWO MORE STATE PRIMARIES

Clark Carried Nebraska While Wilson Won Out in Oregon.

### BIRTH AND DEATH OF MIGHTY SHIP

Here in Chronological Form is Given Start and End of Titanic's Career.

New York, April 20.—From the facts completed by the arrival of the rescue ship the Titanic's story, which began in the fall of 1908, when the White Star line announced its proposal to eclipse all previous records in ship building with a vessel of staggering dimensions, may be outlined chronologically as follows:

1909—Keel of the gigantic vessel laid at Harland & Wolff yards at Belfast.

Full Cost \$10,000,000.

1911—May 31 the vessel is launched and christened the Titanic.

1912—Completed and fully furnished at an outlay of about \$10,000,000.

April 10, noon—Starts on maiden trip from Southampton to New York, via Cherbourg.

April 14—Sends a routine wireless warning ashore of the presence of icebergs off the Grand Banks of Newfoundland.

April 14, 11:40 p. m.—Titanic strikes an iceberg in latitude 41.16 north, longitude 50.14 west.

Her Calls for Help.

April 14, midnight—Carpathia and other vessels hear Titanic's call for help.

April 15, 12:27 a. m.—Titanic's wireless is put out of commission and flashes given that the boat is sinking by the head and women and children are being put off in life boats.

April 15, about 1 a. m.—The first news reached the United States by way of the Allan line offices at Montreal, the Virginian reporting that the Titanic struck an iceberg.

Sinks on April 15.

April 15, 2:20 a. m.—Titanic sinks. April 15, 3 a. m.—Wireless from the Cape Race station directed to the disaster. Associated Press gives first account.

April 15, 3:01 a. m.—No advices. April 15, 5 a. m.—First survivors picked up from life boats by steamer Carpathia.

April 15, noon—Reports current Titanic still afloat and that all are saved.

April 15, noon—White Star officials admit a probable great loss of life.

Fading of Hope.

April 16—Carpathia sends by wireless list of survivors, failing to account for about 1300 persons, including scores of wealthy and prominent people.

April 17—Hope given up that other vessels have saved any.

April 18—Two days elapse without slightest description of disaster.

April 18, 9:30 p. m.—Rescue ship docks at New York with 745 passengers and crew, confirming the loss of all others and bringing the first details of the Titanic disaster.

### NORRIS TRIAL HEARING REBUTTAL TESTIMONY

Members of Grand Jury Being Used to Offset Testimony of Other Grand Jurors.

Fort Worth, Texas, April 20.—The state's rebuttal testimony in the Norris case was resumed today by calling certain grand jury members in an effort to offset the defense's evidence from other grand jurors.

George Hunter, a grand jurymen, said when Grand Jurymen Earl remarked he did not believe there was evidence enough to convict, Mr. Ousley said in effect: "If I felt that way I certainly would not vote for the indictment."

Tom Copp, a patrolman, said after the shooting into the study Rev. Norris objected to reporting the affair, saying "Let's let the matter drop."

The state rested with the introduction of Copp's testimony.

Taking of Testimony Concluded.

Fort Worth, Texas, April 20.—The taking of testimony in the Norris case ended unexpectedly today. Rev. Norris did not take the stand. The arguments will begin Monday. The state ended the rebuttal before noon, and the defense then quickly concluded. The defense called but three witnesses in rebuttal, none materially changing the previous known facts. Court adjourned until Monday.

### NEGROES DROWNED IN MISSISSIPPI FLOOD

Greenville, Miss., April 20.—Fifteen negroes were drowned last night in the Mississippi overflow near Benoit.

Marooned in Trees and on Houses.

New Orleans, La., April 20.—In northwestern Mississippi thousands of negroes and many whites are marooned by the floods in trees, houses, tops and cotton gins. About one hundred men, women and children are hemmed in a saw mill near Norpan, Miss., and are in danger of drowning.

Texas Oil Development.

Beaumont, Texas, April 20.—Construction on the refineries of the Gulf company and the Pierce-Fordyce Association at Port Worth progressed speedily during March, and the plants are now practically ready for operation. Work on the installation of five 55,000-barrel tanks by the Gulf company at Chatterton, Harrison county, was carried on as rapidly as possible under the unsettled weather conditions. The Texas company laid approximately thirty-five miles of pipeline during the month between Dallas and Electra. This company reports being able to make the usual progress on account of heavy rains. The Matamoros Petroleum Company laid seventy-one miles of pipe in March on the Beaumont-Electra line.
